Funeral services for Frosch, the father of five children, will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. at the Methodist Church in Lexington. Rev. Leo Simon of Thorndale and Rev. Verlon Feller of Lexington will officiate. Burial will be in Lexington City Cemetery.

Frosh was a Lexington city commissioner, a member of the school board, and a member of the Lexington Lions Club and St. John's Lutheran Church.

His body was found in the charred ruins of the building early Wednesday after the blaze had been brought under control. The fire broke out at 10:50 p. m.

Alcoa officials said they were "baffled" as to the cause of the fire but reports were that a hydraulic pressure line had broken, spraying hydralie fluid on Frosch and the hot casting machine at which he was working, igniting the fluid instantly:
