Seeing in the News that the cotton crop is short up there this year again, I am sending you a clipping from the Woodsboro News showing the number of bales ginned at Woodsboro up to Sept. 9, which is 4224, and both gins still running day and night. This is a fine country, corn and maize also does well and lots of room for new settlers. Good unimproved land sells from \$35 to \$45 per acre and improved land from \$75 to \$100 per acre, and the oil fever is also pretty high just now. Yours truly,

Cotton weather for the past week ~~has been all that could be asked for~~ hot and dry. Aside from weather conditions, worms, in many instances, have materially aided opening by way of cutting the foliage, allowing the sun to aid in the process. Up to noon today 4224 bales have been ginned, Piehl ginning 2359 and Richter Bros., 1865.—Woodsboro News.
