Mantzel, Tate Are Elected To P-TA District Offices

At the P-TA organizational meeting held in the Memorial Student Center, College Station on Wednesday, Sept. 14, Mrs. S. W. Mantzel was elected president and Mrs. M. Y. Tate corresponding secretary of the newly organized District 20.

Mrs. Crew Henry of Canyon City called the meeting to order, and Mrs. W. F. Hughes of Bryan was elected temporary chairman.

Other officers elected were Mrs. Gene Martin of Brenham, aide to the president; Mrs. Ira Sylers of Flatonia and Mrs. J. M. Daniel of Bryan, vice-presidents; Mrs. J. C. McLaughlin of Bryan, recording secretary; Mrs. H. D. Maxwell of Rockdale, historian; Mrs. J. C. Stewart of Brenham, parliamentarian; Cecil Nabors of Bryan, rural service.

Newly-elected officers were installed by Mrs. Crew Henry. This meeting was honored to have the 9th district president, Mrs. Staten Hatchell of Waco, and other presidents from neighboring districts present.

Due to the growth of P-TA in Texas, it became necessary to reorganize the 16 districts of Texas into 21 districts. District

20 now includes an area of 12 counties: Bastrop, Caldwell, Fayette, Washington, Lee, Milam, Burleson, Leon, Robertson, Madison, Grimes, and Brazos.

Mrs. S. W. Mantzel was born in Washington County, graduated from Brenham High School, attended Blinn College, graduated from Kings Daughters Hospital of Nursing in 1933. She married Jan. 20, 1936.
