"Window Pictures in the Kitchen" was the subject for discussion by the Dime Box H. D. Club in a meeting held April 16 in the home of Mrs. Edwin Wolff.

An attractive and pleasing window picture helps to make work in the kitchen more pleasant and enjoyable. A window box 10 in. wide and 8 in. deep filled with a 2 in. layer of gravel, mixed loam and sand, leaf mold and well rotted manure may be used to grow flowers attractively outside the window. For the indoor window, pot plants such as Ivy, Ferns, Begonia, Geranium and various Cacti may be grown to add a pleasing outdoor effect.

Kitchen curtains serve as a frame for the window picture and usually express the personality of the individual home maker. Gingham, percale, printed or dyed feed sacks, unbleached domestic with rick-rack or antique trim are suggestive curtain materials. Curtains should be bright and cheerful.
