There is still a lot of last year's crop piled up in the fields yet-for the prices are so low the farmers are still waiting for a better price.

Things are looking pretty dull up here yet. There is very little to see but just large listed fields. The wheat is looking very good.

We have been getting letters from our friends in Lee County saying that the corn and cotton are looking very nice and I can very well remember this means get the cotton hoes sharp, for it is time to use them. We do not have this hard work of hoeing, we don't have but one hoe on place.
