Report of Grand Jury.

We have performed the ducies required of us by law to the best of our ability and have found eighteen bills of indictment. We have also carefully examined the reports of road commissioners and find some of the roads in the county reported in good condition, some in passable condition, others in had condition. Some overseers are reported as not having done their duty as overseers, and recommend that the road laws be more fully complied with. We further recommend that overseers be requested to keep the road bed on ground upon which it has been located and not be allowed to change the road bed to cut around such places as need work as such policy prevents the roads from being properly worked and damages a great amount of land in the county. We recommend that the roads be ditched on each side where they are liable to wash, as far as possible and practicable with the means and labor furnished them. Having completed our work, we respectfully ask to be discharged and ask that this report be published in the county paper.
