

Name Cotton, Peanut Committee

Farmers, Businessmen Compose Group

The seven-step plan of producing more and better peanuts was outlined at a meeting of Lee County farmers and businessmen at the County Court House in Giddings Wednesday afternoon. Speakers on the program included E. A. Miller, extension agronomist and S. L. Neal, district agent, both from A. & M. College.

Those present at the meeting filled the District Courtroom to overflowing and named a Lee County Seven-Step Cotton and Peanut Committee. Inasmuch as the same type of discussion was to have been held soon on producing more and better cotton, explained County Agent Brown O. Spivey who called the meeting, a combination committee was set up to save time and expense of another meeting.

Agronomist Miller listed the seven steps to be followed in an effort to increase the acre yield and profit from growing peanuts on the farm.
