AUTO ACCIDENT

Mrs. F. E. Schelnick narrowly escaped a serious accident yesterday morning as she was attempting to cross the H. & T. C. tracks at the lumber yard crossing. A freight train was busy at the shunting or "kicking" of cars. There are three tracks and cars were moving on two of them at the time. Her auto was crashed into by a moving freight car.

Mrs. Schelnick was pinned under the auto which was overturned, and she and the auto were moved several feet at which place some of the heavy parts of the auto derailed a set of wheels of the freight car which stopped the railroad car. Her screams attracted assistance and she was immediately disentangled from under the auto and was carried to the home of Mr. George Kelly

where prompt attention was given her. Her physician thinks that no bones are broken but that she is considerably bruised.

Those who saw the conditions under which the accident happened only wonder how such could have spared the life of the occupant of the auto.
