Miss Caldwell is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Caldwell from Bridge City. Mrs. Caldwell is the former Lillie Moerbe of Giddings, Texas. Barney Hutchinson was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hutchinson from Brandon, Florida.

The bride wore a gown with a sculptured bodice tight fitting long sleeves, that came over the hands in neat points and an overskirt of scalloped ice blue imported chenille lace. Combined of voluminous pleated nylon tulle in ice blue. The sweeping skirt fell into a chappel train over shimmering white bridal satin. Her veil of silk imported ice blue illusion was held by a crown of seed pearls and bridal jewels. They wore gowns of nylon tulle in powdre blue over taffeta with tight fitting bodice coming to a point in the front and fitting to a full gathered skirt. Ice blue pleated tulle fitted over shoulders and the wide neck line.

Annette Hutchinson, niece of the groom from Brandon, Florida, and Loraine Sparks of Bridge City, brides maids, wore Bermuda blue gowns made in the same order. Edith Leibert from the Groves, Texas, and Carolyn Rath of Orange also brides maids, wore gowns made likewise in admiralty blue. Their head-pieces were made into a crown of pink velvet tubing. They carried single cascades ankle lengths florals of rose colored beauty asters.

Della Feldschou was the flower girl, she carried a small basket with small sweetheart roses. She was dressed in baby blue tulle over taffeta, her poke bonnet was made with many small ruffles of tulle. The brim was made of the same lace as the bride's dress.

Don Raskoe was the ring bearer. He wore a navy suit and carried a pillow of ice blue satin to which the rings were tied with small blue ribbons.

Ed Morton of Port Arthur was best man. Groomsmen were Billy Moerbe from Brenham, James Paul

pour from Bridge City, Jimmie Jentile and Tommy Schkade from Port Arthur. They wore double-breasted tuxedos in midnight blue.

Charles Zoch of Port Arthur and Eric Moerbe Jr. of Houston, served as ushers and candle lighters.

The mother of the bride wore a powdre blue gown with pink and town brown accessories, her corsage was of pink feathered crysanthemums.

The bridegroom's sister, Mrs. Guy Rascoe taking his mother's place, wore a red dress with black accessories. Her corsage was of white crysanthemums.

A reception was held at the home of the bride's parents in Bridge City. The bride's table was covered with a lace cloth, a gift from her only brother who is serving with the armed forces in Korea. A three tiered colonade wedding cake was in the center. Four tall white candles and white flowers concluded the bride's table. Mrs. E. W. Steck served the wedding cake. Twenty-five members of the family and friends assisted in serving the refreshments.
