The brides are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Dube of Dime Box.

A graduate of Dime Box High School, Mrs. Pace entered the Seton School of Nursing in Austin. After graduation, she remained on the staff at Seton Hospital until the present time.

Mrs. Bethke, also a graduate of Dime Box High School, attended the Clifton Junior College and the University of Texas prior to her entrance to the John Sealy School of Nursing, Galveston, where she is to graduate in June.
