**Joyce Mitschke Marries Marvin Mitschke
In Immanuel Lutheran Rites, Feb. 7**

The marriage of Miss Joyce Delois Mitschke to Marvin Tilford Mitschke was solemnized in a semi-formal double ring ceremony Saturday, Feb. 7 in the Immanuel Lutheran in Giddings, with the Rev. Max Studdtmann officiating.

Parents of the bride are Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Mitschke of Giddings. The bride, a graduate of Giddings High School, was 1951-52 queen of GHS, majorette for four years, band sweetheart, class favorite, best citizen, and a member of the Homemaking chapter.

The groom is the son of Mrs. Emil Mitschke of Giddings.

The altar of the church was formed by huge baskets of gladioli and snapdragons flanked by seven-branched candelabra holding white tapers.

Traditional wedding music and a selection of pre-nuptial music was played by H. E. Weiser. He also accompanied Mrs. Milton Schroeder, who sang "O Perfect Love" and "The Voice That Breathed O'er Eden."

Given in marriage by her

father, the bride wore a Sylvia Ann original ballerina-length gown of embroidered nylon tulle with a strapless bodice. Over this was a long-tapering sleeve bolero. The bouffant skirt of embroidered ruffled tulle was scalloped around the bottom. The finger-tip veil of bridal illusion nylon tulle was attached to a Juliet cap made of lace, net, and seed-pearls. The bride carried a white satin covered Bible topped with an orchid on ruffled nylon net, from which cascaded white satin streamers.

Mrs. Charles Rost, sister of the bride, attended the bride as matron-of-honor. Bridesmaids were Miss Frances Kappler, Miss Jo Anna Mitschke, Miss Sadie Mitschke, and Miss Grace Nimtz. Junior bridesmaid was Miss Fairy Davenport and the little flower girl was Patricia Hoffman.

All the attendants were gowned in melon and blue ballerina length dresses of ruffled nylon net over satin with a strapless satin bodice and net stole. Each carried nose-gays of ruffled nylon net centered with melon and blue carnations, and wore head-dresses to match. The flower girl was dressed in a white dress and carried a basket of satin, net, and carnations.

Miss Margie Nimtz, niece of the bride, registered guests at the church and at the reception. She wore a blue gown and a melon colored corsage.

groom. Barbecue and all the trimmings were served at approximately 225 guests.
