DISTRICT JUDGE'S RACE

The following figures are not official, but are as near correct as can be obtained before the executive committees of each county meet Saturday July 30 to officially canvass the votes and declare the results. If these figures are correct, Judge Tate of Giddings is elected District Judge, having received 408 more votes than his two opponents, and there will be no runoff.

ELECTION RESULTS

Hon. Theo. Lueders, County Judge of Fayette County the past eight years, was defeated by Hon. John P. Ehlinger, former county judge, by a vote of 3294 to 2583. Richter was re-elected Commissioner, Precinct 2, Fayette County, over Zoch, 704 to 292.

Sheriff Coley White of Travis County for several years, was defeated by Lee Allen by a vote 7506 to 7200. Allen was formerly sheriff of Williamson County and had been in Travis County the past five years. White was the only county officer of Travis County to be defeated.

District Judge W. F. Robertson of Travis County, before whom the sheriffs have been tried in the excessive fee cases, was defeated by D. J. Pickle by the vote 5523 to 4862. Judge Robertson was appointed to the place by the Governor when the court was created last year to try state cases.

Woody Townsend, sheriff of Bastrop County, and one of the sheriffs tried and convicted in the excessive fee cases, was last man in the race. The vote stood: Cartwright, 1684; Smith, 1167; Townsend, 823.

County Judge Sam Low was reelected in Washington County, as was Representative R. A. Fuchs, over opponents.

Senator John W. Hornsby was reelected from Travis County.

Dallas County made almost a clean sweep in the court house this election. One prominent district judge who was considered among the best on the bench was defeated. Bob Hurt is leading man for District Attorney.

Senator J. W. Stephenson of Victoria, Representatives Alfred Petsch, Fredericksburg, and Phil Sanders, Nacogdoches, all outstanding legislators, went down in defeat. Many others were defeated.

Chief of Police Percy Heard, Houston, is leading the incumbent, Sheriff Binford for sheriff. Heard and his men walked in on the Young brothers, notorious bandits, after the bandits had killed six peace officers in Missouri.
